

Study Grants for Dental Students from Rural and Remote Regions

Eligibility

The Study Grants will be available to dental students:

- Who are Australian citizens or permanent residents of Australia;
- Who are enrolled full-time in an Australian undergraduate or graduate entry dental degree immediately leading to registration as a dentist and must have completed at least the first year of that degree;
- Students will be given greater consideration whose principal home address are in non-metropolitan areas as categorised by the Australian Bureau of Statistics' Modified Monash Model (MMM). The assessment of remoteness will be based on the MMM remoteness classification outlined by www.doctorconnect.gov.au.
- Assessment of residency will be based on the applicant's "principal home address" which is the address where the applicant has lived for the three consecutive calendar years prior to the applicant's entry into the dental school or faculty; or five cumulative years since the applicant was 10 years of age. Rural residency will be counted from the time of dental school or faculty entry.

Please provide supporting evidence where possible to enable verification of rural residency.

- Note: Study Grants are not applicable to those students who are enrolled in degree courses to qualify as a dental hygienist, dental therapist, oral health therapist, and/or dental prosthetist.
- Note: Grants are not available to students who have already been the recipient of two or more ADA Study Grants for Dental Students.

- Evidence of enrolment in full-time study for the current and previous year.
- Additional supporting evidence may be included if applicants wish. Some examples of credible evidence include but is not limited to:

- » Reference from a supervisor from a rural placement confirming the length and area of placement and describing their observations of the applicant's commitment to working in rural and remote areas, etc.
- » Evidence of volunteering in a rural or remote area.
- » Evidence of planned future work in a rural or remote area.
- » Receipts for rent, board, utilities etc.

Note 2 Chapter 2 of the Criminal Code applies to all offences against the Statutory Declarations Act 1959 — see section 5A of the Statutory Declarations Act 1959.

A statutory declaration under the Statutory Declarations Act 1959 may be made before—

Terms and conditions

The Australian Dental Association (ADA) welcomes applications for the ADA Study Grants for Dental Students from Rural and Remote Regions.

About the Grant

The ADA Study Grants for Dental Students from Rural and Remote Regions aims to support those Australians who reside in rural or remote areas of Australia. It is targeted to those students who are enrolled as full-time students in an Australian dental degree that would qualify the student to practice as a dentist and have completed at least the first year of that degree.

Each year the ADA will issue up to five Study Grants to those selected dental students respectively residing in rural/remote. Applications will be determined on merit.

Each Study Grant is valued at \$5,000.

Eligibility

The Study Grants will be available to dental students:

- i) Who are Australian citizens or permanent residents of Australia;
- ii) Who are enrolled full-time in an Australian undergraduate or graduate entry dental degree immediately leading to registration as a dentist and have completed at least the first year of that degree;
- iii) Students will be given greater consideration whose principal home address are in non-metropolitan areas as categorised by the Australian Bureau of Statistics' Modified Monash Model (MMM). The assessment of remoteness will be based on the MMM remoteness classification outlined by doctorconnect.gov.au.
- iv) Assessment of residency will be based on the applicant's "principal home address" which is the address where the applicant has lived for the three consecutive calendar years prior to the applicant's entry into the dental school or faculty or five cumulative years since the applicant was 10 years of age. Rural residency will be counted from the time of dental school or faculty entry;
- v) Note that Study Grants are not applicable to those students who are enrolled in degree courses to qualify as a dental hygienist, dental therapist, oral health therapist, and/or dental prosthetist.

Guidelines

- Applications must be submitted via the appropriate form available from the ADA (https://www.ada.org. au/grants). This application form will also require a statutory declaration from the applicant which includes responses to the questions listed in the application form (a maximum of 250 word response per question).
- A judging panel will assess applications based on the judging criteria set out below and ranked based on their final score, from highest to lowest. The top five scoring applicants will be awarded a grant and will be notified by the ADA, by email to the email address provided in the application.
- The judging panel will consist of members of the ADA's Dental Education and Training Committee.

Judging criteria

- Applications will be judged based on the applicants answers to the questions identified on the application form and assessed against the rubric below.
- Judging decisions are final, and no correspondence will be entered into.

Timeframes

Applications for the Study Grants open in January of each year and close by 31 March of that year.

Applicants that are awarded a Study Grant will be contacted following the conclusion of the judging process.
